





CHCF's Environmental Indicators Dashboard: Seventh Publication

- The Environmental Indicators Dashboard was designed at the request of the CHCF Board of Directors to orient Board members to the California health care environment by providing data on a set of statewide key performance indicators that pertain to our work. We originally shared this dashboard with the Board of Directors in June 2018; this is its seventh publication.
- This dashboard is a 30,000-foot view of key statistics relevant to CHCF's mission and work.
 These metrics focus on entrenched, systemic challenges. The data presented are not a direct
 measure of CHCF's impact as we alone cannot move these indicators. However, they do
 highlight where progress is being made and where there remains a need for sustained
 systemic efforts.
- Measure selection and dashboard design guiding principles include:
 - Align with CHCF goals and incorporate a strategic focus on Medi-Cal, Californians with low incomes, listening to consumers, and equity
 - Represent major quality domains (e.g., access, patient experience, clinical outcomes), equity, and cost.
- The data in this dashboard are intentionally drawn from publicly available sources that are
 published year over year. Of note, CHCF funds several of the data sources cited in the
 environmental indicators dashboard, including the California Health Interview Survey (CHIS)
 and the CHCF Health Policy Survey.
- Most of the measures include data from 2022 and later and therefore begin to reflect the impact of COVID-19.
- This year, we changed the preventable hospitalizations by race/ethnicity measure to allow us to use the Department of Health Care Access and Information (HCAI) as a direct source.








Key Takeaways

- Currently, there are important changes taking place in Medi-Cal and health care writ large in California. We anticipate that these developments will impact some of the indicators included in this dashboard over the next few years. However, we underscore that these metrics are related to challenges that will require long-term funding and significant systemic work to change.
- Important health care quality disparities by race and ethnicity:
 - One in four Black Californians report experiencing unfair treatment due to race/ethnicity and there has been an increase over time for all races/ethnicities except for White.
 - The pregnancy-related mortality rate for Black birthing people has decreased modestly over time, however, it is still more than three times higher than the rate for Asian and White birthing people. Troublingly, the rate has increased for all other races/ethnicities.
 - Preventable hospitalizations have seen modest decreases over time for all races/ethnicities, though Black Californians continue to have the highest rates.
- Behavioral health care needs remain immense. Similar to California overall and equally troubling,
 43% of Medi-Cal members who reported needing care say they did not receive it.
- Medi-Cal quality has increased over time. Compared to Medicaid plans nationally, Medi-Cal plans perform similarly or better on about 80% of CMS core measures.
- The number of people who delay or forgo care due to cost continues to rise with nearly one in two Californians overall and about three in four Californians with low incomes reporting postponing or skipping care.
- The number of Californians experiencing homelessness continues to climb, and 48% of those experiencing homelessness also report a disabling condition.
- Only 2% of people dually enrolled in Medi-Cal and Medicare, most of whom are older adults with complex needs, are enrolled in integrated plans. One in four are enrolled in coordinated plans.
